Give-But Carefully

Men and women who will complain loudly and vehemently about a five cents overcharge in a store, have blithely donated as much as \$25 to solicitors without asking where the money is going or who will benefit by it.

Edison First Aid Squad 1 has estimated they have lost nearly \$2,000 in donations because residents have handed out cash and checks to persons saying they were collecting for the first aid squad. This money, intended by residents for use by the local squads, will pay salaries of collectors, support charity cases in other towns, and go for uses in no way connected with Edison.

We do not intend to condemn all soliciting by charitable groups in Edison as there are many worthwhile causes which depend on resident contributions for support, but we do stress that everyone approached check carefully into the organization collecting.

It would be quite a problem to find anyone in Edison who is interested in paying for dinners for down-on their luck men in Patterson, but that is just what happened when some Edison taxpayers donated to a "fund drive" a few weeks ago. These people thought they were contributing to the support of the Edison First Aid Squad.

Don't refuse to give your support where it is

honestly needed, but do check on what you're supporting.





Grist From The Mill

THE THOUSANDS of New York and Jersey City folks who have come "out west" to Edison in the past five years were only follow-ing in the footsteps of men and women who have been doing the same thing for three centuries. And probably for the same rea-sons: more land and greater opportunity.

ONE of the earliest settlers in Edison was Samuel Doty who climbed the bluffs from the Kariclimbed the bluffs from the Karitan River on 1669 to help build the village of Piscatawaytown, between what is now the Nixon-Lindenau area and the River. Doty was then 26 years old and a native American, born in Plymouth Colony. He was a scrappy, adventuresome youth with many of the traits of his father, Edward, whose shrewd wits and flery temper had clashed with the stern Puritans of Plymouth from the day that hardy band had been dumped on the forbidding shores of New England. EDWARD Doty had fought a

had been dumped on the torbidding shores of New England,
EDWARD Doty had fought a
duel with another young Plymouth
swain out of rivalry for the attentions of a young Miss Hopkins. Neither man was seriously hurt and neither got the girl
but both were arrested and sentenced to 24 hours in the stocks
in the public square. This was
the first arrest in the New World,
Doty later became one of the
richest men in Plymouth but the
records show that his cupidity
in acquiring land and cattle were
the cause of many litigations with
his fellow townsmen, He married
a Miss Faythe Clarke in 1635,
shortly after she arrived from
England in the good ship, "Francis", and their large family of

nine children are probably what helped to convince Samuel that his fortune was to be found in newer lands.

newer lands.

WHEN a ship with colonists of the West Indies Company put in at Plymouth en route to the "Jerseys", Samuel Doty shrewdly bargained his experience for passage and sailed with these pioneers through Long Island Sound, the East River, New York Bay and Raritan Bay, up the Raritan River to the mouth of the stream that empties from Silstream that empties from Silver Lake. It took six long years of hard work to build the home and the security of a prosperous and the security of a prosperous farm before he married Jane Harmon there in 1678 and in those years he had become a lleutenant and then a captain of the Militia. Before he died, late in 1715, he had sired ten sons who were to carry the name Doty, sometimes Doughty and sometimes Doten, ever westward. Evenutally one of his greatgreat-granddaughters married a German in western Pennsylvania and some of their descendants came back to the land whence they sprung. they sprung.

AND that is the story of how GRIST came to the EDISON TIMES.
