# Brief Building History of 503 Middlesex Avenue, Metuchen (Block 117, Lots 64 and 65) Current Metuchen Fire Department building

The one-story building at 503 Middlesex Avenue in Metuchen, New Jersey was completed in 1914 by T.M. Barr for John C. Bowers' "Metuchen Automobile & Garage Company." It currently serves as the headquarters for the Metuchen Fire Department.

Mr. Bowers had an earlier location for his Metuchen business in a concrete garage nearby, which, according to editions of *Horseless Age*, he opened towards the end of 1909. The construction of the building at 503 Middlesex Avenue was to expansion his business from his smaller location on Highland Avenue near Main Street. A 1914 issue of *Horseless Age* and local news reports note that there were objections to the establishment of Mr. Bowers' garage in this new location, and that some property owers filed objections which had eventually been overruled by the court. This move to Middlesex Avenue may have also been linked to a desire to be located on newly designated Lincoln Highway (established 1913). Named in honor of President Lincoln, this was the first transcontinental automobile road and runs through Metuchen as Middlesex Avenue, Route 27, and the Lincoln Highway. It was designated as a route from Times Square in New York City to California, and was intended for pleasure touring. As a result, many roadside businesses were constructed along its route during these early years in support of its many anticipated travelers.

The original 50' by 100' building was constructed between September 1913 and March 1914, delayed due to the local opposition to a garage being located in a residential neighborhood. An addition that took place between 1914 and 1920 doubled the size of the structure and resulted in the twin gables of stepped parapets along the front façade.

The building at 503 Middlesex Avenue first appears on Sanborn Fire Insurance maps of Metuchen in 1920; the earlier edition in 1910 shows the property as undeveloped and adjacent to the Washington Hose Company Fire House (earlier historic maps of Metuchen also show the site as undeveloped). Details included on the 1920 map indicate that the building, which appears in its current configuration of two sections each with a front gable roof, was constructed of hollow tile with nine skylights/roof vents, steam heat, electric light, and had the capacity for 50 cars. Also noted are four 500 gallon gasoline tanks buried in the roadway along the front elevation.

City directories of Metuchen list Mr. Bowers as operating a garage in this location through at least 1940. By 1949, as shown on the Sanborn Fire Insurance maps for that year, the building was in use as a municipal garage. Within at least the next year or two, the building also began to be used by the Borough's two fire companies, the Eagle Hook and Ladder Company and the Washington Hose Company. Both of these volunteer fire companies had been established many years earlier, (1882 and 1897, respectively) and were housed in small firehouses they had constructed for their companies (in 1885 and 1905, also respectively).


In 1953, the Metuchen Borough Council, under the leadership of Mayor Joseph Costa, voted to renovate the old garage for use by the two fire companies. The plan, drafted by Pierson and MacWilliams, Architects, included an entirely new front façade, additional floor space, a recreation room, showers, and refinished walls and ceiling.

The local newspaper, *the Metuchen Recorder*, documented a fair amount of opposition to the plan to renovate the old borough garage for this purpose. Opponents indicated that the estimates for the work continued to grow and that the condition of the existing structure was in very poor condition. During a Borough Council meeting in April 1953, one resident called the proposal "a little bit of icing on a stale cake." Mayor Costa countered that the \$48,000 expenditure was cost-effective and the best thing for the department, and that remodeling of the building would also eliminate the "eyesore" that the old garage had become. Costa also stated that "when this work is done, we'll have a building we can be proud of – and one that should last 40 to 50 years." Opposition to the plan, based on the assertion that the existing building would only need additional costly repairs as time went on, continued to be voiced as well as the recommendation that an entirely new facility located elsewhere in the borough should be constructed.

However, the council did pass the measure and it seems like there were several factors leading into the decision at the time, including development pressures including major commercial changes along Main Street, Menlo Park mall being planned nearby, and very expensive school expansions. The local papers were also full of concerns about the volume of traffic and pedestrian conditions, and it seems that citizens and council were dealing with a great number of changes in and around the borough. Within the next couple of months, however, the council itself underwent a great change as several from the opposing political party were elected to office. One of the most vocal opponents of the renovation, Karl E. Metzger, was elected Mayor. By this time, however, the renovation had been completed.


While changes to the interior have clearly taken place, the exterior footprint of building is nearly the same as it was upon the completion of the renovation in 1953. However, its façade is heavily altered and very few, if any, original architectural features remain from its construction as an automobile garage along the Lincoln Highway. The original rusticated stone front façade, with its twin stepped parapets, was significantly altered as part of the 1953 renovation, and all the front bays were reworked to accommodate fire engines. A quick inspection of the interior shows that little or no original historic features remain inside.






Detail, March, 1914 article from a New Brunswick newspaper













Undated photograph on file in the Metuchen Fire Department archives. The original façade of the building at 503 Middlesex Avenue is in the background behind the ladder truck.

## Metzger Urges Council Remap Its 'Ill Advised' Plans for Firehouse

The "Firehouse Flasco" is going to get a complete airing during the next week. Metuchen Democrats have promised,

With Karl E. Metzger. Democratic candidate for mayor, speaking for opponents of a \$48,000 face-lifting for the Borough Garage, the opposition to the plan has been gaining strength all week,

Mr. Metzger's views are described later on in this article. He told The Recorder he and other Democratic candidates will offer more detailed suggestions at tonisht's meeting in the American Legion Home on Lake Avenue at 8:30 p.m.

Besides the Democrats, several citizens of no strong party affiliation have voiced opposition to the Borough Council's firehouse plans. BACKGROUND

Last month, the Borough Council voted \$33,600 toward remodeling the garage into a modern home for Metuchen's fire-fighting equipment. At that time, some opposition was voiced to the idea of spending the money on an old business. One resident called it "putting icing on a state cake."

When the architect's specifications were put up for bids, the council found that somebody had underestimated how much the work would cost Every single bid was far higher than the council's appropriation.

One centract was awarded anyway, so that the work could get started while the council prepared to raise some more money. At the last council meeting, an ordinance was introduced to raise an additional \$14,000 in bonds to pay for the firehouse.

MAYOR, ARCHITECT EXPLAIN

How come the 40 parcent increase in the cost of the building?. The Recorder tried to find out, but could not get all parties concerned to agree on a definite answer.

The original plans were drawn up by the architecture firm of Pierson and MacWilliam. John MacWilliam told this newspaper last week.

"I don't know where the figure (of \$33,000) came from."

Borough officials told his firm, Mr. MacWilliam said, that they wanted as good a job as possible for a "reasonable" expenditure.

Mayor Joseph L. Costa said the architects were told that the council would not spend more than \$30,000 for work on the building. The rest of the original appropriation was to pay architects' fee and legal fees

Even at the \$48,000 price, Mayor Costa said, remodeling the building is the best thing Metuchen can do for its firemen. He pointed out that the borough will be getting an entire new front on two buildings, beautifying an "eyesore" in the center of town. The proposed work also will provide heat for both buildings, as well as not floors, walls and ceilings.

"When this work is done," the mayor said, "we'll have a building we can be proud of and one that should last 40 to 50 years."

The mayor also pointed out that \$3,500 of the new appropriation is for contingencies and may not be eyent. There was no contingency fund in the original appropriation, he said. The bonds will fost the borough a total of about \$4,050 a year for 10 years, Mr. Costa said.

The secretary to the president of Ruthers University and Democratic candidate for mayor said his party is in favor of improving firehouse facilities. But it considers the proposed \$48,000 expenditure wasteful.

Mr. Metzger said:

"It is perfectly clear that there is a need for improving the firehouse facilities, and the Democrats are glad to note that the Borough Council is trying to fill the need. But we cannot help thinking that the council has been ill advised in its decision to renovate the present structure at a cost of \$48,000—more than 40 percent greater than the originally estimated cost of \$33,600. And incidentally, this 40 percent increase of \$14,000 makes us wonder about the kind of advice which the council has been getting—and accepting. Something or somebody is wrong somewhere.

"Since the cost has risen to \$48,000, we of the Democratic Party believe that there must be a better answer to the problem than rejuvenation of the present structure. Perhaps an entirely new building, erected on borough-owned land in a suitable section of the borough, would cost no more, or at least little more, and in the long run real economy could be effected.

"A modern, up-to-date firehouse would surely be far more desirable than one which at best could only be repaired—and then repaired again after a few more years. If the problem is to be solved, it ought to be solved as permanently as anything of this nature can be.

"We suggest, therefore, that the council study the entire matter again, with a particular view toward learning whether a new and modern frechouse, located appropriately, can be built at the sume relative cost as the project which is now being planted it would even be a good idea to give real consideration for more all equipment not related to the firehouse proper, such a garbaze tracks and street channel equipment—to a remark part of the town, keeping the fire equipment centrally founded to

Mr. Metager said there will be some definite suggestions tonight about locating the proposed new building.

ANOTHER PROPOSAL

Related to Mr. Metaker's proposal is another that has gained favor during the past week

Proponents of this plan point out that the present firehouse is one of the most valuable pieces of property in town, tax-wise. They point out also that it is not ideally located for a firehouse because the trucks from there have to go through the heaviest traffic on Main Street.

If the building were sold to a commercial firm, this group argues, the taxes from the property would pay a large amount of the money necessary to put up a new firehouse elsewhere. The new firehouse might be built on some property that the borough has taken over for back taxes—property that is yielding no tax income to the borough's treasury.

The arguments will be heard Monday night at 8 p.m. in Borough Hall at the public hearing for the bond issue.




PEEVIEW—Here is an artist's conception of what the Campbell School will look like after the proposed new wing is added. Sketch


