
Old School!

Take a look at some of these schools... no cafeterias,

gymnasiums, internet... or indoor plumbing! None function as a school anymore, but two of these one-room schoolhouses are still in existence: the Old Franklin School (owned by a civic league, it is celebrating its 200th birthday this year) and the Oak Tree School #6 (expanded and turned into a private home). Another difference from today is how the students dressed... take a look at the Franklin School Class of 1890 at right!



Match-A-Map




Can you match the dates to these maps? Our area certainly looks a lot different now than it did years ago, with a lot more roads and houses. The answers are at the bottom of Page 4.

Joseph Bonaparte (Napoleon's brother) moved to New Jersey in 1815 upon being exiled after serving as the King of Spain and Naples.


New Jersey has more horses per square mile than any other state.

This past Spring, school children throughout Edison Township pitched in to raise approximately \$5,000 to help save the Thomas Alva Edison Memorial Tower, an important historic site located on Christie Street in Edison.

The Art Deco tower, which is listed on the New Jersey and National Registers of Historic Places, is in the process of being restored, and a new and expanded museum and is being planned for the site.

Using their creativity, the students sponsored a variety of fundraisers including: Crazy Hair Day, sale of glowin-the-dark Edison Tower wrist bands, Extra Chores Week, bake sales, and sponsorship of paper light bulbs.
