With temperatures a bit below average for a February evening in Metuchen, New Jersey, frigid weather was probably the last thing on ninevear-old David Kotkin's mind.

David, a member of Metuchen Cub Scout Pack 70, received an award that night at the pack's annual Blue and Gold


dinner, held at the Presbyterian Social Center on Monday, February 21, 1966. But there was more in store for David than just the award.

At the time, David was practicing ventriloquism, inspired by his television-

ventriloquist hero, Paul Winchell. However, sometime within the next year, he developed

a serious interest in magic.

The stories of his magical origin vary depending on who you ask, but the one his mother, Rebecca, told was that she and David's father, Hyman (known as Hy), brought him to Louis Tannen's magic shop at 120 West 42nd Street in New York City to buy him a new

ventriloquist puppet. During that first visit of many, David succumbed to magic's enchantment and, within a few short years, would perform magic routines, such as the Dancing Cane, better than many professional entertainers, ultimately becoming a household name

> and the most magician to date.

If you haven't guessed by now, I'm talking about David Copperfield, whose real surname is Kotkin.

Despite Rebecca's claim, David's earliest live exposure to magic

might have been at that 1966 Cub Scout dinner, most likely before his visit to

> Tannen's. The evening's entertainers were two 13year-old boys from nearby Perth Amboy, New Jersey: magician Jack Greenhouse, aka "The Great Jaquini," and his twin brother, Ken, a ventriloquist who called his act "Ken and Clark" (Clark, of course, being the puppet).


#### **Tropical Petland Memories**

The Society frequently receives inquiries about places near and dear to people's childhood memories, and Tropical Petland often tops this list along with the Forum Theatre, Edison Lanes, Danfords, and Metuchen Center.

Tropical Petland's owner/operator, Bruce Jensen retired in 1997 but still lives on Newman Street in Metuchen with his wife, Lee, and several large aquariums. He is now 85 and living with Parkinson's, but a motorized stair lift helps him get to his basement filled with his beloved tropical fish. On May 19, his family organized a celebration of life for him, giving those who knew him – or of him and/or the store – a chance to visit and reminisce. Bruce and his



family graciously spoke with Historical Society members during the gathering about his life-long passion and how his father got him started in the business. He also spoke about first operating on Amboy Avenue for five years, with a partner, and then moving to his famous Main Street location on his own for the next 38 years. Those many decades in business fueled his passion for caring for tropical fish, the imagination of many children, and inspired a love of animals in countless others.



Social media comments inspired by the announcement of the Roosevelt Park gathering included those from former and current residents who fondly remembered the store. Many recalled working there, stopping in for supplies, finally acquiring a long-awaited pet, or simply visiting the store on the way home from school. The monkey and "Mac" the parrot are remembered by throngs of Metuchenites who believe Tropical Petland was one of the reasons growing up here was so special.

# WHEN THE QUEEN CAMPED AT KILMER

The six-season television series "The Crown" has recently concluded, and while it extensively portrayed Her Royal Highness Elizabeth II's life story, not every aspect was covered. If additional episodes are ever made, the Metuchen-Edison Historical Society respectfully requests the addition of in-depth coverage of the events in her life during October 1957; it was then, during a State visit, that she travelled through New Jersey on her way to New York City.

The Queen had expressed a desire to take the Staten Island Ferry and her handlers obliged by arranging special rail transport from Washington, DC. The route went through our area on October 21, stopping for 4 hours and 15 minutes at Camp Kilmer. While uneventful, the stop at Camp Kilmer in Edison took place from 3:00 a.m. to 7:15 a.m. in order to facilitate a more appropriate time for the Queen's and Prince Philip's arrival at the ferry.


### RESEARCHING OUR LOCAL HISTORY: SANBORN FIRE INSURANCE MAPS

Several years ago the Society organized a "Researching the History of Your House" workshop and since then we have had many requests to do so again. While it's definitely something we are interested in doing and we truly enjoy helping residents learn more about their homes' histories, this kind of research is extremely specific to individual properties. In other words, covering broad topics and resources can be instructive, but what we often find most helpful for residents is looking at one specific property at a time. Some resources will prove incredibly helpful for some properties but yield nothing for others. In this new series of articles in *Nannygoats*, we will preview some of these resources and what, in a best-case scenario, they may be able to yield in terms of local history information.

For this issue we are highlighting Sanborn Fire Insurance Maps. We frequently find they can provide a good idea of a building's construction date, materials, use, and additions over time. However, there are limitations as to what these maps can tell us; only heavily developed areas of a municipality are covered, potentially leaving much of a town's built environment out of range. For primarily rural or agricultural areas, there may have been no map coverage at all.


Sanborn maps were only issued for certain years, sometimes resulting in large gaps between years. For example, Metuchen has maps issued for 1903, 1910, 1920, 1929, 1949, and 1959. The 1903 maps only cover a small portion of mainly the downtown area, but with each successive map, the range of coverage does increase a great deal. Regardless of their limitations, Sanborn maps are still "local history gold" for the areas they do cover. Sanborn maps also note street numbers, which frequently changed as a town developed. These maps can help greatly with tracking street numbers over the years, providing an opportunity to match up with other records such as directories, censuses, and historic photograph archives.


Shown here are excerpts of the maps showing Robins Hall at 401 Main Street in Metuchen. We know from other sources that it was built in 1873, but the Sanborn maps provide additional information about how the building was used. For example, in 1903, the building is shown as a three-story building with two commercial spaces.




Metuchen Council chambers, and rooms for the local Masonic lodge.



# WHY "LINDENEAU" History Mystery Remains *Un*solved

A question the Society often receives is "where did the name Lindeneau come from and what are its boundaries?" The Society is not yet sure how the name "Lindeneau" (sometimes spelled "Lindenau") became associated with the neighborhood in the southern end of Edison around the school by that name, but we have been gathering clues. To add to the confusion, the area has also been referred to as "Blossom," "Highland Park Terrace," and "Haven Homes."

The earliest references we have found for "Lindeneau" are from shortly after 1900; in 1904 it was referred to as the "quiet neighborhood" in which Adolphus Cornelius, heir to a Prussian estate, lived. From around 1906 onward, it was frequently referred to in advertisements for real estate and in news articles about marriages, chimney fires, and more. A 1909 development map shows "Lindeneau Terrace" owned by William A. Spencer of Perth Amboy. From around the mid-1910s onward, there are even more frequent print references to the name with regards to local sports teams, businesses, and transportation routes.

The best we can guess without definitive proof is that it was named by an early resident or builder, and may derive from 'Lindenau,' a town located between Berlin and Leipzig in Germany, an area known for its woods, wildlife, and 800-year-old castle. Perhaps a German or Prussian landowner or builder – possibly the Adolphus Cornelius mentioned above – was thinking of their homeland, started calling it by that name, and it stuck. There have also been stories about a Hungarian picnic grove and "gypsy" campground in the area, so perhaps the connection is there somehow.

We have found some comfort in our not knowing for sure in a 1949 news article that addressed the vagaries of neighborhood names and Lindeneau's in particular. Maybe we will know for sure someday, but for now it remains an *unsolved* History Mystery.





#### Sgt. Uhrin's Marker Installed

On Veterans Day, November 11, 2023, the stone marker for Staff Sqt. Michael Uhrin was unveiled in a small ceremony at Hillside Cemetery in Metuchen. Sgt. Uhrin was laid to rest in May 2023 (see Nannygoats Volume 21, Issue 2 for more about his service), but the marker was fabricated and sent later from the Department of Veterans Affairs.



#### We Will Always Love Lucy!

Nannygoats readers will remember our feature issue on the (untrue) local legend that Lucille Ball once lived in our area, and perhaps they will also remember our follow-up article with additional information from the gentleman in whose company she was seen during her visit to the area.

A recent social media post led to even more information about the Queen of Comedy; while visiting Kenny Berg in Edison Township, she stayed at his home at <u>6 Moraine Road</u>. While that neighborhood may not exactly be the Hollywood Hills, it's close – in addition to be an extremely lovely home, it is only a block away from the childhood home of Nancy Shevell, who married Sir Paul McCartney in 2011. We also learned that the Berg and Shevell families were friends!

I found no written account of which magic routines Jack performed that particular evening, but it's fascinating to visualize young David—a future magic superstar—in the audience watching the magician instead of being the magician.

The Central New Jersey Home News, dated Thursday, February 24, 1966, reported the dinner a few days later, mentioning not only the Greenhouse boys but also David.

It's not clear what effect the Greenhouses' performance had on David or if he was friends with them, but it wouldn't be too long before he, himself, would entertain publicly as a magician. According to John MacIver, a Clementon, New Jersey, resident who grew up in Metuchen the same time David did, Hy's friend, Mr. Webb,

drove David to his first show at the Kiwanis club when David was around 11 or 12.

Although John doesn't remember more precisely when that show occurred, on February 22, 1969, 12-year-old David performed as

"Davino the boy magician" at Watchung Hills Regional High School for a program called "Magic and Movies," sponsored by the American Field Service (AFS).

While David must have done several more gigs throughout 1969 and 1970, the next record of Davino performing appears in the same newspaper almost two years later, announcing a show he would give on

December 5, 1970, at Metuchen's Franklin School, now the site of a residential development:

Seven months after his show at the Franklin School, "the Great Davino," now 14 years old, performed at Port Reading School #9 in nearby Woodbridge Township, as recorded in the Courier-News on July 19, 1971.

Four months later, on November 21, 1971, "Davino and his Magic Doves" performed pro bono at the Rutgers College Student Center for a charity hosted by a local Kiwanis club. The Sunday Home News announced it two weeks earlier:

I assume the paper copped the phrase from the business card David used around that time: "The entertaining magic of Davino and his Magic Doves." On the next page is an image of the card, courtesy of MacIver.

The following year, David, a 15-year-old junior member of the International Brotherhood of Magicians (IBM), attended Ring 200 meetings between at least January

and June at a church located at 1212 Livingston Ave. in North Brunswick, New Jersey. (For the uninitiated, a "ring," derived from the classic magic trick, the linking rings, is the IBM's term for a local branch or chapter of its

organization.)

Between April and September, David's name appeared in Ring 200's ring reports, published in The Linking Ring, the IBM's membership journal. His ring performances included such feats as "a flashy 'rope to cane' effect," a murder-mystery routine by Tony Spina called "Room for Doubt," a comedy routine called "W.C. Fields Does A Card Trick," the "Gypsy Thread," and Karrell Fox's "The Magician's Helping Hand." David's performances at

the ring prompted Jim Angelo, Ring 200 secretary at the time, to write, "Very ingenious, these young [magicians]!" and "A very funny idea, presented well," referring to the Fox effect.


So it's easy to see that even from his earliest days as a teenage magician, David preferred doing magic routines with stories—a performance style he honed to perfection and ultimately parlayed into artistic and financial success. However, for the time being, he would continue as Davino, but not for very long. The final published announcement I could find of him performing under that name appears in *The Courier News* of December 10, 1973, a few weeks before his library "Christmas magic show" on December 28.

Only a few months after that holiday show, in the spring of 1974, 17-year-old

David placed an ad in Variety as "Magician-Actor David Copperfield," probably one of the first printed uses of his new stage name, borrowed from the Charles Dickens character. That ad would lead to his first big break.

A producer in Chicago needed a young magician to play the lead role in a new musical called "The Magic Man." He saw the ad and auditioned David. Before graduating from high school in







June, David negotiated the part. Later that year, after teaching "The Art of Magic," a class for the Watchung Hills Adult School enrichment program, he moved to Chicago to begin rehearsals.

The musical, in which David sang and danced as he performed a variety of original illusions, opened on December 12 at the First Chicago Center. During this time, the show was well-received, and David even attracted the attention of producer Norman Lear, who expressed interest in having David play the part of a magician in a sitcom, which apparently never materialized. "The Magic Man" ran for eight months, and David returned to New York, where he "starved for a few years," as he put it in one interview.

That was probably a slight exaggeration because less than a year after "The Magic Man" closed, he starred in his first primetime television special, The Magic of ABC, appearing with celebrities as they promoted the ABC lineup for 1977. The rest of David's career is, as the idiom goes, history. For those too young to know that history, David went on to make a total of 18 annual prime-time television specials from 1977 to 1995, star in his own nightly show at the MGM Grand in Las Vegas, assemble one of the largest magic collections in the world. purchase 11 resort islands in the Bahamas. earn 38 Emmy nominations with 21 wins, and become one of the highest-earning celebrities in the world.



than most magicians of his day. While he's done everything from performing film-inspired vignettes to making the Statue of Liberty disappear, David's greatest feat of magic was transforming himself from a shy, lanky, adolescent ventriloquist into arguably the world's finest modern

illusionist.

David Copperfield retweeted this article, thanking me and referring to it as "Amazing detective work." He also offered his own memories, clarifications, and corrections in the Twitter thread. See below for Mr. Copperfield's commentary.



Thanks to Interval Magic for amazing detective work... It means a lot. My first introduction to learn the art (besides the book in the Metuchen Library) was from Danny Tsukala who sold magic at Macy's. We were looking there for a better vent[riloquist] figure, Tannens came soon after.

At Tannen's I was befriended by Ed Mishell. [He] reviewed magic for Genii magazine, illustrated Tannen's catalogs, and drew the blue Davino card (my second card). I drew my first one. Ed would sneak me into adult SAM meetings. I was not of age.

Inventing magic seemed to be natural for me. In a few years, Harry Lorayne put one of my creations in the legendary "Tarbell Course in Magic." Tarbell 7, Page 53 (I think). I was 12 years old. I don't recall teaching in Warren. I do remember teaching at NYU at 16.

In the beginning, the Greenhouse Twins truly had an impact. It was my first experience with childhood envy. They were hired to perform at my temple INSTEAD OF ME! My temple!!! They were very good. I guess I needed to improve. I hope to meet them again someday.


